First, and most importantly, we have provided great care in a happy, home like environment to approximately 180 residents since the first of the year. We have gotten numerous compliments from residents, family and friends including hand written thank you notes from family members whose loved ones spent their final days here.

Second, we have added some great people to our management team in addition to those that were with us before the year began. We have a strong management team that works together effectively and cooperatively. We have a nice building, but without the quality of people that we have, it would be an entirely different place. The best thing for the Widows Home, and its residents, is to keep this dedicated team motivated and together.

Third, Widows Home has had a strong financial year. Through October, on average 93% of our 75 beds were filled. That is much better than the state average and has made this year profitable. As they say in the non-profit world, "No money, no mission." As we continue to strengthen financially, we will be able to do more for our residents, approximately three-fourths of whom are on Medicaid, and for the community in general. We were blessed this year to receive community related grants that have permitted us to widen our reach.

With this year's Harvest Home annual fundraising campaign in full swing, I thought I'd share an excerpt from an article that appeared in the Journal Herald on October 8, 1939 entitled "Harvest Home Day Will be Held By Widows' Home on Wednesday"



"What is this big building at the corner of East Fourth and South Findlay street: the place with the two acres of ground around it, the wide lawn, and the banks of flowers? What is this place with its annual Harvest Home day Wednesday, which is a tradition among us?

An institution of some kind, perhaps? No. Not an institutional institution at any rate. Some old residence of departed glory. No.

An ancient farm house, still standing on its home grounds? No.

None of these. It is the Widows' home, a place built to be a very real, quiet and comfortable home for old ladies. The institutional idea is conspicuous by its absence. The photographer said, "Why this isn't an institution. This is a home."

...The Association organized its annual Harvest Home day, the first being held on October 8, 1887, and continuing without break these 52 years. In the old days, people who felt they couldn't afford to give money would give in kind, bringing in a sack of potatoes or some jars of jelly or preserves, dressed chickens, sausage, walnuts, or what not. Even the kids would go out and gather walnuts and make their donation on Harvest Home day.

...The Home will be open for callers on Wednesday, with Director Helen J. Currier as receiving hostess."

Today at the Widows Home, we cherish and continue the tradition of the annual Harvest Home campaign. The generosity of others allows us to continue to serve the frail and elderly in the neighborhood where we've sat for the past 142 years.

Employee of the Month




Sharon Boggs
