# Did you know that our home was actually the forerunner of the YWCA?

Originally, our home was known as the Dayton Female Association which took care of orphans in a building on Magnolia Street (the current site of Miami Valley Hospital.) When an 1866 legislative act turned the care of orphans over to the county, the original building sat empty for a few years. Once our founder, Nancy Trotter Bates, discovered a new group of individuals needing help, the destitute widows of Civil War soldiers, she needed to legally acquire a new building. (The portrait in the front lobby just outside our parlor is that of Nancy Trotter Bates.) What had been the Dayton Female Association reorganized to become the Women's Christian Association (the forerunner of the YWCA) in 1870. Unfortunately, Mrs. Bates died just a month before the reorganization, so her daughter, Susan Winters, was asked to become president of the Association.

A 1872 legislative enactment permitted the transfer of the property and little home to the new Women's Christian Association. The Association served women for many years there until the new Victorian style home was built on our current site on Findlay Street in 1883. You can view a new, large scale picture of the Victorian home now hanging in our 2nd floor Board room.

Our home was run by the Association until 1961 when ties were severed with the YWCA by mutual agreement. The missions no longer aligned as the YWCA was serving the young at that time while the Widows Home was caring for the elderly. The Widows Home of Dayton, Ohio was born as a not for profit corporation on April 1, 1961.



The Widows Home received two surprise donations of warm apparel items just in time for Christmas. The nonprofit Life Essentials agency's Socks for Seniors campaign donated many pairs of warm socks and footies. And Mechanical Systems of Dayton, just down the street from us on Springfield, donated throw blankets, socks and slippers. All of these made for wonderful Christmas gifts for our residents!

Also \$616 was pledged in the Harvest Home campaign by staff members specifically to support all that the Activities department does for residents, as well as personal care items for those residents in need.

Thank you to our very generous Widows Home employees!!

During the month's of November & December, the Widows Home hosted the annual Wreath Auction. This auction raised \$227 for the Activities department.
